SUBJECT: Resolution No. 4602

RECOMMENDATION:

Request approval of Resolution No. 4602 authorizing the submittal of a \$19,150 Pass-Through Indian Gaming Grant application from Chandler Firefighter Charities to the Gila River Indian Community.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

The grant funding sought by Chandler Firefighter Charities is intended to be used to teach fire safety to third-grade students in Chandler through the use of the Fire Safety House program. The two-story mobile house provides a safe, realistic place for students to practice good fire safety exercises. The attached Tribal application provides a detailed account of the request.

PROPOSED MOTION:

Move to approve Resolution No. 4602 authorizing the submittal of a \$19,150 Grant application from Chandler Firefighter Charities to the Gila River Indian Community.

RESOLUTION NO. 4602

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHANDLER, ARIZONA, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION FOR AN INDIAN GAMING REVENUE SHARING GRANT TO GILA RIVER INDIAN COMMUNITY ON BEHALF OF CHANDLER FIREFIGHTER CHARITIES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$19,150

WHEREAS, pursuant to A.R.S. § 5-601.02, Indian tribes entering into a tribal-state gaming compact shall contribute monies to “. . . cities, towns and counties . . . for government services that benefit the general public, including public safety, mitigation of impacts of gaming, and promotion of commerce and economic development”; and

WHEREAS, those Indian tribes entering into a tribal-state gaming compact have various grant application procedures for evaluating which cities, towns and counties, and which government services, will receive gaming revenue sharing contributions pursuant to A.R.S. § 5-601.02; and

WHEREAS, it has become a relatively common practice for cities to authorize the submission of grant applications for such Indian gaming revenue sharing grants on behalf of 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that are deemed to be providing government related services that benefit the general public; and

WHEREAS, Chandler Firefighter Charities, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, has requested that the City authorize the submission of an application for such Indian gaming revenue sharing grant funding to Gila River Indian Community on its behalf in the amount of \$19,150; and

WHEREAS, the deadline for accepting applications for grant funding by Gila River Indian Community is June 30, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the funding sought by Chandler Firefighter Charities is intended to be used to teach fire safety to third-grade students in Chandler through the use of the Fire Safety House program. The two-story mobile house provides a safe, realistic place for students to practice good fire safety exercises; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager’s Office has reviewed the application materials prepared by Chandler Firefighter Charities, and believes that the funding request described in such application materials qualifies as being for government related services that benefit the general public and is consistent with the City’s Administrative Regulation regarding such grant applications.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Chandler, Arizona, that:

1. Chandler Firefighter Charities is hereby authorized to submit the application materials prepared by Chandler Firefighter Charities, that are attached hereto, together with this Resolution, to Gila River Indian Community.
2. The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute the application, in the form attached hereto, in conjunction with the grant application to be submitted to Gila River Indian Community on behalf of Chandler Firefighter Charities.
3. Within ten (10) days of the City's receipt of any grant funds from Gila River Indian Community pursuant to a grant application submitted on behalf of Chandler Firefighter Charities, City staff is directed to mail a check to Chandler Firefighter Charities covering one hundred percent (100%) of the funds received by the City from Gila River Indian Community pursuant to such application.
4. The City, by virtue of this Resolution, is simply acting as a financial conduit between the Gila River Indian Community and Chandler Firefighter Charities, and is in no way:
 - (a) Agreeing or obligating itself to monitor or report on the expenditure of any grant funding distributed to or on behalf of Chandler Firefighter Charities; or
 - (b) Guaranteeing or warranting the accuracy, completeness or truthfulness of the information set forth in the application materials prepared by Chandler Firefighter Charities; or
 - (c) Supervising, or taking any responsibility regarding, the actions or activities undertaken by Chandler Firefighter Charities; or
 - (d) Representing that Chandler Firefighter Charities either has, or does not have, other sources of funding relating to the intended use of grant funding set forth in this Resolution, including funding from grant applications made on Chandler Firefighter Charities' behalf to other Indian tribes.





The organization received 501(c)(3) non-profit organizational status on February 4, 1994. The name was changed from Chandler Emergency Relief Fund to Chandler Firefighter Charities in 2011. The tax id for the organization is 86-0744102.
5. Describe the nexus between Requestor and the City of Chandler and its residents. Chandler Firefighter Charities (CFC) is operated by Chandler firefighters in conjunction with Chandler IAFF Local 493. CFC is dedicated to safeguarding Chandler citizens and to helping people who have faced some type of emergency situation and are in need of assistance. In pursuit of this mission, the organization distributes funds to meet the basic needs of fire victims, people who have experienced a medical emergency, and individuals or families in crisis, and makes direct contributions to other charitable organizations such as the local Red Cross, the Salvation Army, and the Maricopa County Burn Center. CFC provides fire and life safety and prevention education, first aid classes, and cardiac resuscitation training to community members.
6. Specifically, but concisely, describe how the grant funding sought by Requestor will be utilized (please do not just refer to general description included in the application materials). Grant funding will be used to provide the Fire Safety House program to third grade students attending school in Chandler. The Fire Safety House is a mobile two-story house that provides a safe, realistic place for children to practice crawling low under smoke to escape fire, and to learn about smoke alarms, home fire hazards, and fire escape plans. Chandler Firefighter Charities provided this program during the 2011/12 school year through a non-renewable grant from the Arizona Diamondbacks Charities.
7. Describe how the use for which funding is sought will provide “government (related) services that benefit the general public, including public safety, mitigation of impact of gaming and promotion of commerce and economic development”. (See A.R.S. § 5-601.02(H)(4)).

This Fire Safety House project satisfies the Public Safety priority area by increasing fire safety awareness throughout Chandler. The U.S. Center for Disease Control reports that 85 percent of all fire deaths occur in the home, and young children are one of the populations most vulnerable to fire related injury or death. This project safeguards children in Chandler against fire hazards by giving every third grade student the opportunity to learn about home fire safety in an interactive environment known as the Fire Safety House.

8. Describe how the use for which funding is sought will benefit Chandler residents as a whole rather than simply benefiting a particular individual, entity or class of individuals.
The target population for this program is third grade students. The lessons learned impact a wider audience as these third graders share their experiences with siblings, friends, and family members. Each child goes home with a handout explaining the importance of Exit Drills in the Home (EDITH) and directions for creating and practicing a home fire escape plan with the whole family.

A. NARRATIVE

1. Purpose of Grant

a.) Describe the proposed program or project.

Young children are one of the age groups most vulnerable to fire related injuries and deaths. This statement merely informs many of us. To firefighters, it conjures up nightmare.

Late one night, Chandler firefighters responded to a horrible fire in the oldest part of the City. The home was engulfed in flames. Thick black smoke made it very difficult to see, and the intense heat made entering the house almost impossible. Most of the family was outside, but a child was trapped in his bedroom. Risking his life, a firefighter shattered a window and entered the inferno to rescue the child. After what seemed like an eternity, he reappeared cradling a lifeless body in his arms.

No child – not a single one – should suffer such an awful death. Chandler firefighters dedicate their lives to preventing these tragedies. Chandler Firefighter Charities was founded to help them.

Smoke alarms and fire safety education are effective ways to safeguard children from fire. From 1998 until funding was lost in 2009, Chandler firefighters taught fire safety to children with the Fire Safety House, a mobile two-story house that provides a safe, realistic place for children to practice crawling low under smoke to escape fire, and to learn about smoke alarms, home fire hazards, and fire escape plans. This year, Chandler Firefighter Charities was able to bring the Fire Safety House back to third grade students at Chandler elementary schools with a non-renewable grant from Arizona Diamondbacks Charities. This grant will be fully spent by June 2012.

Chandler Firefighter Charities is asking the Gila River Indian Community to partner with us to continue the Fire Safety House program during the 2012/13 school year. By providing the \$19,150 needed to bring the Fire Safety House curriculum to every third grade student in Chandler, the Gila River Indian Community will have an immediate and significant impact on the prevention of fire related tragedies in Chandler.

b.) Describe how the proposed program or project satisfies one or more of the “priority areas” identified by the Gila River Indian Community.

The Fire Safety House satisfies the Education priority area by providing a fire safety program for Chandler elementary schools. The schools have traditionally relied on firefighters to provide life safety education for their students. This role has become more critical over the past few years since funding for the Police Department’s DARE program was eliminated in 2008.

This Fire Safety House project also satisfies the Public Safety priority area by increasing fire safety throughout Chandler. The U.S. Center for Disease Control reports that 85 percent of all

fire deaths occur in the home, and young children are one of the populations most vulnerable to fire related injury or death. This project safeguards children in Chandler against fire hazards by giving every third grade student the opportunity to learn about home fire safety in an interactive environment known as the Fire Safety House.

The Fire Safety House is a kid-sized mobile home equipped with a kitchen, living room, upstairs bedroom, and second story escape ladder. The house features multiple props including a simulated smoke machine, a “flaming” cooking pot, heated doors/door knobs, working smoke detectors, and electrical outlets. When the Safety House arrives at a school, firefighters first talk about the dangers of smoke and fire and the importance of smoke detectors. The children are taught to recognize fire hazards such as matches, candles, cooking, and electrical appliances, and told how to react when a smoke alarm sounds or they see smoke or fire. The Safety House is then filled with artificial smoke and each child has a turn to practice crawling low beneath the smoke and exiting the “burning house.” This hands-on experience prepares the children to react safely and appropriately in case of an actual emergency.

The Fire Safety House experience is particularly effective for third graders, who soak up everything they see, hear, and do at that age and can’t wait to share what they’ve learned with their family members at home. One firefighter was approached at the grocery store by a parent who told him, “I know all about the Fire Safety House. My third grade son won’t quit talking about it!” A group of high school students recently shared their memories of the Safety House with a Chandler firefighter during a presentation he was making to their class. Over the years we have heard stories from both teachers and parents about children who acted on lessons learned at the Safety House by reminding parents to test smoke alarms, calling 9-1-1 in an emergency, and even taking younger siblings out of the house when a pan caught fire on the stove.

c.) Identify the needs/problems to be addressed, target population and number of people to be served by the project.

Chandler’s Fire Safety House program serves children living within the City of Chandler’s 71.5 square mile planning area. The area encompasses all of the Chandler Unified School District (CUSD) and portions of Mesa Public Schools and the Kyrene School District. There are a total of 39 elementary schools: four Mesa schools, five Kyrene schools, and 30 elementary schools in the CUSD. These schools have a total of 172 third grade classes.

The target population for this program is third grade students at these schools. Past experience has shown that third graders are the age group most receptive to this program and most enthusiastic about practicing fire safety skills in the Fire Safety House. The lessons learned impact a wider audience as the children share their experiences with siblings, friends, and family members. Each child goes home with a handout explaining the importance of Exit Drills in the Home (EDITH) and directions for creating and practicing a home fire escape plan with the whole family.

During the 2011/12 school year, there were 3,915 third grade students in Chandler. The ethnicity of this group varied as follows: 58 percent Anglo/White, 8 percent Asian/Pacific Islander, 7

percent African American, 24 percent Hispanic/Latino, 2 percent Native American, and 1 percent multiracial or unknown. It is likely that the 2012/13 school population will reflect similar demographics.

One-third of these students attend Title I schools. At least 35 percent of the students at these schools have been identified as “at risk” of academic failure based on poverty levels, which are determined by the number of students qualifying for free or reduced school lunches. Some areas of the City, particularly the central core in zip code 85225, have much higher percentages of students from households living at or below the poverty line, households headed by a grand parent or single mother, and where Spanish is the primary language spoken at home. Nationwide, higher incident rates of home fires and fire related injuries and deaths are correlated with poverty.

The U.S. Fire Administration reports that 85 percent of all fire deaths occur in the home. Four out of 10 fire deaths occur in homes without fire alarms. Fire and burns are the fifth most common cause of unintentional injury related deaths in the United States. Young children are the age group at highest risk for fire related injury or death. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention identifies smoke alarm installation and fire safety education programs as the most effective means to prevent these tragedies. The Fire Safety House program can and will help prevent one or more of the 3,915 Chandler third graders in our target audience from being injured or killed by a fire.

d.) Describe the project goals and objectives, and your plan to meet them.

The primary goal of this project is to prevent children from being injured or killed in a home fire by using the Fire Safety House to teach home fire safety to Chandler third grade students. A secondary goal is to increase fire safety throughout the community as these children share the lessons learned at the Fire Safety House with their parents and siblings.

The plan is to tow the Fire Safety House to Chandler elementary schools during the 2012/13 school year where each third grade class will receive one hour of instruction. There are 39 elementary schools and 172 third grade classes in Chandler.

Instruction will be provided by a team of four firefighter educators: one teaches, one operates the props (smoke machine, etc.), and two help children in the Safety House.

From 1998 through 2009, the Fire Safety House was a central component of Chandler’s fire prevention efforts, and it was included in the Chandler Fire Department’s annual budget. Funding for the Fire Safety House program was eliminated in 2009 when the economic decline forced spending reductions across all City departments. Last year the program was funded by Arizona Diamondbacks Charities. Chandler Firefighter Charities is seeking funding to continue the program during the 2012/13 academic year. We hope the Gila River Indian Community will help us continue this life-saving program in our city.

e.) Define the project as a new or continuing program.

This project is being presented to GRIC for the first time. Up until 2009, funding for the program was provided by the Chandler Fire Department. The program was not offered in 2009/10 or 2010/11. During the 2011/12 school year, the program was paid for with a non-renewable grant from Arizona Diamondbacks Charities. Chandler Firefighter Charities is hoping to partner with the Gila River Indian Community to continue the program during the 2012/13 school year.

f.) Identify other organizations, partners or funders participating in the project and their roles (see attachments section).

The Fire Safety House Program owes its success to a partnership among various community groups. The central partnership is that among the three school districts serving Chandler (i.e., Chandler, Kyrene, and Mesa) and Chandler Firefighter Charities. The firefighters have worked closely with principals and teachers to develop lesson plans that are both age appropriate and can be reinforced by the teachers during classroom time.

Past support for the Fire Safety House has come from the City of Chandler, IAFF Local 493, Save-R-Kids Foundation, Redmond Homes, FEMA, and the Arizona Diamondbacks Foundation. The original Fire Safety House was built in 1998 by members of IAFF Local 493 using materials provided by Redmond Homes. A new Fire Safety House was purchased in 2004 using funds from the Assistance to Firefighters Fire Prevention and Safety Grant program (FEMA). The program was funded this past year by Arizona Diamondbacks Charities.

g.) Indicate any application to and/or awards made by a Tribe other than the Gila River Indian Community for state shared revenues for this and/or any other projects/programs.

No other application or award for this project has been made to or received from a Tribe other than the Gila River Indian Community.

h.) Provide a timetable for implementation.

The Fire Safety House program will be taught throughout the 2012/13 school year. The number of months needed to complete the program will depend on when Fire Safety House presentations can be scheduled at the elementary schools.

i.) Identify long-term funding resources.

The Fire Safety House program is operated solely with grant funding. The sustainability of the project will depend on the ability of Chandler Firefighter Charities to secure future grants for this purpose.

- **Describe your plan to document progress and results. Interim and final reports will be required for every grant awarded.**

A progress report will be submitted at six months documenting all work accomplished. The report will include the number of Fire Safety House presentations given, the number of children served, and a detailed report of expenditures. A final report will be provided within 60 days of the close of the grant. Chandler Fire is willing to adjust these suggested reporting procedures to suit any other reporting requirements established by GRIC.

Each class completes the Fire Safety House program in an hour. Four firefighters are needed: one teaches, one operates the props (smoke machine, etc.), and two help children in the Safety House. Chandler has 39 elementary schools and 172 third grades. Firefighters are paid \$25/hr. One of the firefighters works an additional hour at each end of the day to transport and set up the house. The total cost for 766 hours of labor is \$19,150.


